**SPELLING “JUDGMENT”**



In law, **judgment** means “a court’s final determination of the rights and obligations of the parties in a case.” Remember that there is only one “e” in judgment. Thus, **the correct spelling is JUDGMENT, not judgement.**

- The court entered a **judgment** in favor of the plaintiff.
  
- The **judgment** included injunctive relief and damages.
